Remembering the 21 Hearts

The St Mary's community had the rare privilege of Theatre 180's original production of 21 Hearts being staged in the Lady Wardle Performing Arts Centre in August. Written by Jenny Davis OAM, it is a dramatisation of the story of Sister Vivian Bullwinkel and the World War II Army nurses involved in the sinking of the SS Vyner Brooke, the massacre on Banka Island and later becoming prisoners of war (POWs). St Mary's Old Girl, Peggy Farmaner ('30) was one of the nurses who perished on Banka Island. Members of Peggy's family, her nephew,

Rev Polson

'The life God calls us to live' – The Reverend Joyce Polson OAM

As one of the first women in Australia to be ordained as an Anglican Priest, long remembered for her wit and down-to-earth manner, Rev Joyce Polson OAM will always remain in the hearts of countless Old Girls and members of the St Mary's community. A Deaconess to many and Chaplain then Chaplain Emeritus to others, she was approachable, had insight into the problems of the day, gave spiritual and practical advice, and easily stepped in and out to assist when she was required to. With her deep faith inspiring her, and her care for others energising her, Rev Joyce served St Mary's for over 60 years.

Rev Joyce had a soul that helped carry the burdens of her community, even if they were not aware of it or of her faith. She approached life with the same head-on drive that she bowled in cricket, her second love after God. With her passing this year, she left a bequest to the School, allowing future generations of St Mary's girls to benefit from her generosity, and with that, learn from and hopefully reflect upon her uplifting final words: 'God loves me, God forgives me, God is with me. Say it every day—teach it to everyone. Think about it, for from those words will come the life God calls us to live.'



With Open Arms

Father Richard Pengelley was commissioned in 2019 and ended his tenure as Chaplain at St Mary's in 2024 with the Patronal Eucharist, the service that honours the patron saint of our School, Saint Mary.

His service to St Mary's has been inspirational and deeply spiritual, building on the universal messages of love and charity. Fr Richard brought a wealth of understanding and compassion to his role, guiding us through adjusted services in a world pandemic and the loss of some dearly loved members of our community. As the new Assistant Chaplain, Reverend Ruth Chapman said, 'I am forever indebted to him for his grace and support he has shown me...Fr Richard leaves St Mary's with our collective love and prayers.' Reverend Ruth comes to us from the United Kingdom, having served in a variety of pastoral roles for over a decade.



St Mary's Parish 125 Anniversary

St Mary's West Perth Anglican Parish Celebrated its 125th Anniversary!

The Tuesday October 2024 was the 125th Anniversary of the founding of the St Mary's West Perth Parish, as it was officially constituted on that day in 1899. The parish hall was designed by J. Talbot Hobbs and built before the church, that was designed by P. W. Harrison, completed in 1906 and consecrated by Archbishop Charles Owen Leaver Riley OBE. Constructed in the style of Gothic revival in the shape of a Christian cross, it had a central aisle (or nave) and altar, a vaulted timber ceiling, arches, stained-glass windows, and a west-facing rose window. Due to financial constraints, the church was never completed, which helped lead to its eventual demolition and rebuilding in 1981, catering for a changing demographic and needs of the parish in West Perth. Builders removed the popular rose stained-glass window in 1980, keeping the tracery to reconstruct it into the new church, at the same height, and with the same dimensions and footprint as the original. The famous organ was also removed and rebuilt into the



new church, albeit with a different orientation. With the growing needs of the blossoming parish community and regeneration of the West Perth area for residential living, a new parish hall was added and greater space for parish offices was created in 2002.

The 125th Anniversary celebratory service was overflowing with clergy, community, good will and energy. The strength of the parish and the commitment of its congregation were as strong as the singing from the choir. Hymns were plentiful and powerful, and as Jeremy Buxton, the Warden of St Mary's said of the church, it is, '...a multicultural congregation reinforcing Anglican Chirstian commitment while building on a long, faithful local history; and a parish that is a constructive part of the Perth Diocese.' Even though its very foundations may have been reconstructed, in essence, it is still our St Mary's, with a wonderful future.
